The STUDENT EXCELLENCE AWARD, administered by the University Lloyd International Honors College, is UNCG's premier award to outstanding undergraduates. To be eligible for the award students must be seniors, must have earned at least a 3.65 overall GPA, and must be recommended by at least two faculty members. Winners of the award are judged superior in such academic qualities as creativity,

originality, motivation, analytical skills, and ability to communicate. Evidence of these accomplishments is typically found both inside and outside the classroom. Each year the Honors Council, the advisory body to the Lloyd International Honors College, invites departments and faculty members to nominate students for the award. The Honors Council studies the nominations and selects the winner.

Melinda Alston majored in Communication Studies and is described by one professor as “exceptional even among the best of the best in our department.” She demonstrated her leadership skills when she helped create a program for Dudley High School’s 9th grade students to encourage tolerance of diversity and respectful behavior. She was so dedicated to the project that she continued to work with Dudley students throughout the current academic year. She has served as a research assistant for Dr. Roy Schwartzman on the *After Words* Project, an analysis of Holocaust survivors’ stories, and has done significant archival research at the Visual History Archives of Holocaust survivor testimonies at UNC Chapel Hill. Melinda has presented papers at academic conferences and is a managing consultant at the University Speaking Center. Her community involvements include the Beloved Community Center and the Minimum Wage Campaign in Greensboro. A member of Lambda Pi Eta honor society, she aspires to be a college professor.

Ashley Warriner Andrews majored in Interior Architecture at UNCG, after earning an earlier degree in art history. Her leadership qualities were evident in her position as Community Outreach Chair for the campus chapter of the International Interior Design Association, and she participated in nearly every community function in which the department engages—“from planting trees to staying up all night for a design *charette* to benefit the Salvation Army.” Last spring she volunteered as a design mentor to teen mothers in the course called “Advocacy through Design” offered through the YWCA. Her research incorporates visual icons from numerous disciplines to enhance her verbal analysis of interior products used throughout history. One professor describes these graphic presentations as a *tour de force* and considers Ashley to be one of the best students she has witnessed in ten years of teaching at UNCG.

Erin Andrews has a double major in English and Women's and Gender Studies and has done original research on the impact of theories of embodiment upon poststructural theories of subjectivity. This cutting-edge work is advanced for an undergraduate, even for a graduate student. Erin was elected to Phi Beta Kappa as a junior and this year was inducted into Sigma Tau Delta, the international English Honor Society. She won the Honors Symposium Prize for the best paper submitted in Arts and Humanities and is the recipient of a Butler Centennial Merit Scholarship and the Sally and Alan Cone Women's and Gender Studies Major Scholarship. Erin is a peer consultant in the University Writing Center and has been deeply involved in Warren Ashby Residential College, including service as a mentor and chair of the student/faculty development committee.

Tamoor Asif is an outstanding Biochemistry major who has done research in Dr. Greg Raner's laboratory on the metabolic pathways governed by cytochrome P450 enzymes. His careful technique in the lab led to his completion of some of the critical final experiments on two research projects that were submitted for publication. His professors praise his intellectual ability, his motivation to excel, his work ethic, and his quiet confidence that is both polite and respectful. One professor rates him "easily in the top 5% of students" he has taught and "wish[es] every student put forth the same effort." Tamoor plans on a career in pharmacy.

Brittany Atkinson is a Bryan Scholar with a major in International Business. She has studied in Germany, made two presentations at the NC International Student Leadership Conference, and served as a panelist for the UNC in DC Internship Program and for the Parent Panel during International Education Week. She was a Special Initiatives Intern for the Peace Corps in Washington, DC, where she facilitated meetings with the UN Secretary-General in a Peace Corps/ United Nations initiative to donate 500,000 computers to students in Africa by 2012. She continues to edit grant proposals for this project and will work in a field office in South Africa this summer. She plans to enter the Peace Corps after graduation.

Samantha Bardarik has a double major in English and Classical Studies, studies Latin and Ancient Greek simultaneously, plays clarinet

for the University Band, serves as secretary for the Classics Club, and works in Jackson Library. She is currently enrolled in both the Lloyd International Honors Program and Disciplinary Honors in Classical Studies. One professor praises Samantha for her “prodigious intellect, keen analytical abilities, and superb verbal proficiency with a hunger for learning, significant initiative, an admirable work ethic, humility, and conscientiousness [that] make her a rare student. He continues, “a student this gifted and this conscientious deserves to be recognized.” Samantha plans to attend graduate school in archaeology and forensic anthropology.

Jodi Bennett-Bradshaw majored in Anthropology and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Pi Delta Phi (the French honor society). She has been on the Dean’s and Chancellor’s lists since 2005, despite keeping up with her family responsibilities and community involvement. Her area of research involves a combination of physical, cultural, and archaeological studies in pursuit of important information about health and disease in pre-historic populations. She has worked for three years as an undergraduate teaching assistant in the laboratory and has served as president of the Student Anthropological Society. Jodi was also invited to be the field assistant for the Nutrition Education for New North Carolinians project.

Dillan Bono is a double major in German and Economics and has done exemplary work in both fields. During her study-abroad year at Mannheim University in Germany, she worked to promote cross-cultural understanding by, among other things, developing a 3-day presentation for English students at Mosbach-Neckarelz high school. This semester she is working with Dr. Lixl of the UNCG German department to develop a course about German division and reunification from 1945 to the present. In addition, she is a Bryan School Study Abroad Peer Ambassador and is the author of the podcast “The Next Generation,” a discussion about autism from a sibling’s perspective, on the streaming website Autism One Radio. At UNCG she worked with Students Take Action Now: Darfur (STAND) for three years and participated in a campus-wide effort to raise \$10,000 for Hurricane Katrina Relief.

Jordan Brafford came to UNCG after earning an Associates Degree in Early Childhood Education. She will graduate from UNCG with a B.S.

in Human Development and Family Studies with a Concentration in Birth-Kindergarten with a Teaching License . In addition to parenting her own young child she has consistently performed at the highest level. She has a perfect record of all As, with most of those being A+. She plans to work with young children without disabilities in a classroom setting.

Hannah Bristow will graduate with a degree in Communication Sciences and Disorders and will leave behind an impressive record of academic achievement and service. As Vice President of the UNCG chapter of the National Student Speech Hearing Language Association, she helped organize a silent auction, acquiring more donated auction items than ever before in the history of the event. The proceeds went to student scholarships and charities. She also organized her department's job fair, again the largest of its kind at UNCG. She has volunteered as a tutor at local elementary schools, for the Special Olympics, CSD's preschool language-literacy summer camp, and the NCSHLA's Spring Convention. In the words of one professor, she "has consistently distinguished herself as a scholar and as [a] student leader."

Johanna Cochran has a major in Business Administration with a Concentration in Human Resources Management. A native Spanish speaker, Johanna is fluent in both English and French. She is president of the UNCG Legal Professions Association, and she runs its email tree for all pre-law students. As a member of the Leadership Challenge program, she has worked with refugees in Greensboro and assisted area immigrants through Lutheran Family Services. She has been on the Dean's list and the Chancellor's list and is a member of UNCG's Golden Chain. She will complete Disciplinary Honors in Business Administration through the Lloyd International Honors College.

Allison Conley, who is described by one of her professors as a "one in a million" type student, has excelled in her major in Interior Architecture. She has served as a teaching assistant and is a leader in her sorority and the International Interior Design Association student chapter at UNCG. Last year she studied in Paris, where she wrote a bilingual paper entitled "How Much of an Emphasis does France put on Sustainability in Modern Architecture?" She also had an internship working on historic preservation with a design firm in Chantilly. She is known throughout

her program “for her solid design work...excellent research and articulate writing.”

Rebecca Fecher is a History major, planning to pursue a Masters Degree in History and Public History. Known for her ability to make connections, she sees learning as a cumulative process and has excelled in advanced and graduate-level courses. She had an internship with the Trading Path Association, a commercial firm that provides historical research about Native American trading paths in the Piedmont. This information is crucial to property developers and historians alike. Her article based on this work was published in the *Journal of Backcountry Studies* and is available at www.library.uncg/ejournals.backcountry.asp.

Meghan Fitzgerald is a Biology major with a concentration in Environmental Biology. She participated in a newly NSF-funded Math-Bio Undergraduate Fellowship program at UNCG, where she was part of a team of three students that developed a “new model system that integrates the experimental and mathematical aspects of kleptoparasitism.” This study will lead to a greater understanding of behavioral evolution. Meghan’s work with dung beetles resulted in two peer-reviewed journal articles, and she has given ten oral presentations and five poster presentations at regional, national, and international conferences. Meghan tutors high school students through NCQUEST, belongs to the UNCG Women’s Rugby Club, and is a member of the Lloyd International Honors College. On top of all this, she works 20-30 hours per week and never fails to exhibit poise and maturity. She plans to pursue a PhD in animal behavior.

Sarah Gaffney majored in Exercise and Sport Science with a dual concentration in Physical Education Teacher Education and Community Youth Sport Development. She is a member of the American Association for Physical Education, Health, Recreation and Dance (AAPHERD) and has been manager for the UNCG Women’s Basketball team since 2007. She works with underserved kids in after-school programs at the Greensboro Boys and Girls Club, and last summer she was part of an instructional team that worked with children and families in La Preciosita, Mexico. She is as conscientious in the classroom as she is dedicated to her community volunteer activities, and she impresses both students and faculty with her leadership skills.

Christine Gould is a History major who has been vice-president and is currently president of the UNCG History Club. When the History Club took a field trip to Washington D.C. last year, Christine arranged for club members to tour the Capitol Building under the auspices of her local Congressman. She has turned the History Club around, getting affiliation with S.G.A., helping create the club's website, and maintaining the club's bulletin board in the MHRA building. She has been instrumental in organizing panels with outside speakers on the American Civil War, the Holocaust, and "Governments Shrouded in Mystery: Russia, China and Cuba." And, oh yes, she earned the first and only A+ in Dr. Jeff Jones' "Russia to 1900" class.

Alyson Gustin has an exceptional academic record as a Communication Sciences and Disorders major. She is president of the UNCG chapter of the National Student Speech Language Hearing Association (NSSLHA) and has been recognized for her accomplishments by the National Scholars Honors Society and Order of the Omega. She has been a leader in the Chi Omega Fraternity, tutored at a local elementary school, and volunteered for the Make a Wish Foundation. Winner of several academic and leadership scholarships at UNCG, Alyson is a truly outstanding student.

Kyra Haifley is a Marketing major with a minor in Studio Art. Her accomplishments include membership in Beta Gamma Sigma Honors Society, Golden Key International Honor Society, National Scholars Honor Society, and the Student Art League. She has done volunteer work for Habitat for Humanity, VF Community Outreach Program, as well as participated in the Hospice Hope Run and the Race for the Cure. Having one internship is impressive; Kyra has had three: at Trone Advertising in High Point, and VG Corp. and Market America, both in Greensboro. One professor comments, "Ms. Haifley...[gave] a final oral presentation ...[that was] the most sophisticated and compelling, highly quantitative assessment in the domain of foreign market selection that I have ever witnessed in my 20 years of employing [the Export Odyssey student team project]."

Jacqueline Hobbins is a Chemistry/Biochemistry major, who was the first student in her department to begin the new B.S. degree in Chemistry

with a concentration in Research. She was awarded an Undergraduate Research Assistantship, the GlaxoSmithKline Women in Science Scholarship, and the Jean Dreyfus Boissevain Undergraduate Scholarship. Her research has resulted in three poster presentations at regional conferences in Greenville, SC, and Augusta, GA, and her poster on “Initial docking Studies Between a Fusion Protein Associated with Clear Cell Sarcoma and its Inhibitory Antibody” was selected by the UNCG Undergraduate Research Expo, 2007, to be presented at the state capitol. She has also worked as a paid teaching assistant in UNCG’s Thermodynamics laboratory, in addition to her job as a lab technician at Wesley Long Hospital.

Meghan Hoffman is a double major in English and Theatre with an impressive list of accomplishments that includes service as a University Marshal and a Katharine Smith Reynolds Merit Scholarship. She is a member of the Lloyd International Honors College and lived in International House for a year, where she worked as a transition assistant. In pursuing a BFA in Acting, she has acted in plays at UNCG, Triad Stage, and the North Carolina Shakespeare Festival. One recommender writes, “She is widely considered the finest actress in the Department of Theatre at present and one of the finest in anyone’s memory.”

Her intellectual curiosity and superb analytical skills are augmented by her compassion. When a Theatre Dept. faculty member suffered a series of strokes, Meghan organized students to visit and read to this person for over a year.

Meghan Hughes will graduate with a B.S. in Human Development and Family Studies with a Concentration in Birth-Kindergarten with a Teaching License. She is on the Chancellor’s List and is a member of the Lloyd International Honors College and Kappa Omicron Nu, the Honors Society for the School of Human Environmental Sciences. Her technical and social skills made her an important addition to the team of four faculty members who were applying for a grant in Birth-Kindergarten: Interdisciplinary Studies in Education and Development. In addition, she has volunteered for Habitat for Humanity, worked as a counselor at Camp Firstshine that serves children with special needs, and traveled on mission trips within the U.S. and to Bolivia.

Joshua Johnson is slated to graduate with full University Honors in Philosophy through the Lloyd International Honors College. He is the winner of an Honorable Mention for the Roger Schwirck Award for Excellence in Philosophy and is a member of Phi Sigma Tau (Philosophy), Eta Sigma Phi (Classics), Golden Key International Honor Society, and the Classics Club. He has worked as a tutor and targeted review facilitator for Philosophy, Ancient Greek, and Classical Mythology and presented a paper at this year's UNCG Undergraduate Honors Symposium. Described by one professor as "in the top 1% of all students we have had at UNCG, including those who have gone on to graduate school in philosophy." Josh plans to pursue a PhD.

Taishika Knight is a Sociology major with a Concentration in Criminology. She is currently engaged in two internships, one with the Guilford County Sheriff's Department, one with the District Attorney's office. In addition to her continual presence on the Chancellor's and Dean's Lists, she is a member of AKD, the Sociology honors society, and has received recognition from the Scholars Recognition Program in the Office of Multicultural Affairs. She volunteers at the Black Child Development Center, the Department of Social Services, and her son's school. The single parent of a special needs child, Taishika has done a masterful job of balancing her academic, family, and community commitments.

Katy Landis is a senior in the Department of Recreation, Tourism, and Hospitality Management, working on a B.S. degree in Recreation and Parks Management with a Concentration in Therapeutic Recreation. In addition to her excellence in the classroom, she has volunteered as a camp counselor at the Muscular Dystrophy Association Summer Camp, the Health Fair at Friends Home, and Habitat for Humanity. She worked effectively as a recreation programmer in the Beyond Academics program and was responsible for planning and implementing an Inclusion and Adaptive Fitness Workshop for a local fitness complex. She would ultimately like to obtain a PhD in Physical Therapy.

Candace Lapan has a double major in Communication Studies and Psychology. She has served as a Residential Advisor in Ashby Residential College, often handling crises that most faculty and staff will

never confront in their lifetimes. In addition, she has served as a Communication Consultant in the Speaking Center, conducted workshops for faculty and students, and trained other Residential Advisors. She plans to go to graduate school in psychology.

Chelsea L'Italien is a Bryan Scholar and member of the Lloyd International Honors College. An active campus leader, she has served on the Merit Awards Interview Committee twice, spoken at the NC International Student Leadership Conference at UNCG, and participated in a student panel during International Education Week. Her volunteer work includes working at the Guilford County Animal Shelter and at the American Lung Association Trek Across Maine. In addition, Chelsea studied abroad for two consecutive semesters, first in Lyon, France, then in Sydney, Australia, where she completed an internship with All Pacific Travel Concept. She graduates with a Business Administration major.

Joshua Long graduated from UNCG with a degree in English in 2007. This year he will complete a second undergraduate degree in Biology in anticipation of a career in medicine. He won a UNCG Undergraduate Research Assistantship and worked on GABA receptors involved in snail metamorphosis in Dr. Esther Leise's laboratory. In 2008 he presented a talk about his research at the annual meeting of the North Carolina Academy of Science. According to one professor, "He functions more like a graduate student than a part-time undergraduate assistant, and is more engaged intellectually in his research than many Masters students I have known." His volunteer experience includes 800 hours at Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center and fund-raising for research for the ALS Association and for the Leukemia Lymphoma Society. He also participated in a public health internship—the Collaborative to Strengthen Families and Neighborhoods project.

Michelle Martin will graduate with a major in Exercise and Sport Science. She has excelled academically and is a strong health and fitness advocate. She has worked at Wake Forest University Medical Center as a data analyst for the past three years. When she noticed that the women in her department often spent 8 hours a day at their desks with bad backs as a result, she brought physioballs into the office for the workers to sit on. This should strengthen their core muscles and reduce the incidence of back pain. In addition she has volunteered 150 hours in a variety of

physical therapy settings. She plans to attend graduate school and become a physical therapist.

Margaret McCaskill is an outstanding Mathematics major, who has consistently been on the Dean's and Chancellor's Lists and is a North Carolina Teaching Fellow. She was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa as a junior and Pi Mu Epsilon (the Mathematics Honor Society) as a sophomore. She has served as an Undergraduate Assistant in the Math Help Center and received the award for the NCCTM Outstanding Mathematics Education Student—Central Region in 2008. Her community service includes working with the Children's Health and Welfare Celebration, fundraising for St. Mary's House, serving as an acolyte at St. John's Episcopal Church, and volunteering as a tutor at the UNCG Teaching and Learning Center and at Southern Guilford High School. She was also an intern at Kiser Middle School and at Northeast Guilford High School, and she participated in the Piedmont Young Writers Conference.

Kassandra Mae (Kassie) Miller will graduate with a major in Public Health Education. She is an outstanding student, whose academic work outshines that of many graduate students. Evidence of her leadership abilities includes serving as president of Eta Sigma Gamma, the public health honors society, and initiating service projects like the Human Race fund-raising event in Greensboro. She also volunteered to do community-based research on a project that has given low-income individuals bicycles and safety training. She received a Loretta Williams Research Award to do this work, and obtained a second Loretta Williams Research Award to develop a mother-daughter health promotion program. She is currently interning with Smart Girls, an adolescent sexual health education program, and has accepted a paid position with Smart Girls after graduation.

Joseph Jeremiah Neal is described by one professor who knows him well as a "once a decade student" who "epitomizes how Emerson defined the ideal student in his essay 'The American Scholar.'" An English major, his passion is poetry, and he plans to pursue an MFA in graduate school. He is someone for whom words count a great deal. Another quote from one of his recommenders sums him up best: "Jeremiah Neal is a model for what our students could be. His ... GPA confirms that.

But it is his quiet voice in the classroom and his powerful voice on the page that brings his academic excellence into our collective lives.”

Elizabeth (Liz) Nemitz will earn Disciplinary Honors in Nursing as a member of the Lloyd International Honors College. She was awarded a UNCG Undergraduate Research Assistantship to do work on a project entitled, “The Cultural Competency of Nursing Students.” Last year she presented a paper at the International Association of Human Caring Conference held in Wisconsin; more recently she had a refereed abstract accepted for presentation at the National Conference on Undergraduate Research. She is co-founder of the student organization Health and Social Justice, which serves the wider Greensboro community and partners with other community organizations, such as Food Not Bombs and the Farm Labor Organizing Committee. She serves on the School of Nursing Race and Gender Committee and volunteers at Peaceful Beginnings, an organization that helps new mothers. She also volunteers with the YWCA’s teen mentoring program and is trained as a doula for pregnant teens. She has helped four teens through pregnancy and delivery so far. She has also volunteered at Healthserve, which offers primary care to individuals without health insurance. Finally, she is a member of Golden Chain.

Robert Norris will graduate at the top of his class in Sociology with a concentration in criminology. He was awarded the Outstanding Criminology Student Prize for this year out of over 160 criminology concentration majors. He was inducted into Alpha Kappa Delta honor society as a junior and was awarded the Pratto Scholarship for excellence in Sociology. While studying at Manchester Metropolitan University in Manchester, England, he worked collaboratively with students at Caledonian University in Glasgow to develop a Wiki site on female street gangs and violence. His high achievement has not been affected by the fact that he has worked 25-30 hours per week throughout his college career. Robert plans to pursue a PhD in criminology and has already been accepted to NC State and to SUNY-Albany, the #2 criminal justice PhD program in the country. Both schools have offered him financial support, and he anticipates hearing from several other institutions before deciding where to go.

Thomas Patterson will be one of the first Environmental Studies majors to graduate from UNCG, and he has set the bar high. Environmental Studies is an interdisciplinary major, and Tom has taken advanced courses in eight departments, earning outstanding grades across the board. He has been on the Dean's List and the Chancellor's List every semester. Tom's commitment to sustainability has taken him beyond the classroom to work in the Office of Waste Reduction and Recycling, to serve as chair of the UNCG Student Initiatives Sustainability Committee and student representative on the Environmental Studies Committee. He has held several offices in the UNCGreen environmental club, including three semesters as president. He has worked on numerous educational events and represented OWRP and UNCG at national and regional conferences on renewable energy and environmental advocacy. In addition to all this, he has worked part-time at the Friendly Bike Shop.

Rachel Pullen is a Political Science major with an impressive list of accomplishments, beginning with her excellent academic work. One of her research papers took her to Washington DC to interview staff at the National Coalition for the Homeless. The presentation she gave on this research, which included an interview with a homeless man, was described by her professor as "the finest piece of academic work by a student that I have observed." Rachel is a member of the Lloyd International College and will graduate with Full-University Honors. She served as a student representative on the LIHC Honors Council and was Co-Assistant Chief University Marshal. She served as the SGA Student Attorney General and supervised a student committee to revise the SGA constitution. In the summer of 2007 Rachel was selected to be a legislative research assistant in the North Carolina General Assembly. When she went to New Orleans on spring break to help with reconstruction, she was recruited to talk to local high school students about the importance of education. As a result of this experience, she will join the Teach for America program after graduation. She ultimately plans to attend law school.

Stephanie Rinehart is a Media Studies major, who earns high praise from her professors and peers. She has consistently been on the Chancellor's List and is a Chief Marshal in the UNCG Marshals. She was a research assistant in the spring of 2008 and helped update a course for which she co-authored the study guide. She is Director of Media

Workshop (the BCN Department's weekly lecture series), Chair of the Ashby Residential College Yearbook Committee, and Academic Honors Chair of Alpha Lambda Delta Honors Society. She was North Carolina Student of the Month for February, 2008, and was chosen for membership in Golden Chain. She is an office assistant in the Office of the Associate Provost for Undergraduate Education, a Spartan Television member, and has been an assistant for theatre productions. In addition, she was a highly commended intern for Morgan's Mark Productions independent feature film, *Mississippi Damned*.

Alegria Rodriguez will graduate with a major in Dance Education. Last summer she received the Sadie Dunn Doxie Undergraduate Research Award from the School of Health and Human Performance to study world dance styles and to develop a teaching resource for dance educators that includes background information, lesson plan ideas, and a DVD demonstration. In her Dance Pedagogy course, she adapted guidelines intended for college, high school, and middle school dance teachers. Her professor described her work on this as "Really brilliant ...extraordinarily thoughtful and in-depth." This professor sent Alegria's assignment to the originators of the unit and to dance faculty from other institutions and is now using it as a model for her current students.

Rebekah Bair Sanders will graduate with LIHC Disciplinary Honors in Nursing. She received an Undergraduate Research Assistantship which led to work on the development of manuscripts, grant development, and Institutional Review Board applications and presentations. Currently, she serves as the undergraduate student representative on the School of Nursing Curriculum and Evaluation Committee. She was a Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center Extern Scholar and Marshal for the School of Nursing at UNCG. She has organized blood pressure screenings at a local inner city church and served as a role model for under-privileged girls at risk for teen pregnancy and drug abuse.

Katie Scott will graduate with LIHC Disciplinary Honors from the School of Nursing. The title of her project, which she presented at this year's Honors Symposium, is "Helping Older Adults Find Meaning and Purpose Through Storytelling." She has served as the School of Nursing's Class of 2009 treasurer for two years and has been on the Dean's and Chancellor's Lists throughout her time at UNCG. She was a

junior Marshal for the School of Nursing's special graduation exercises last May. Described by one professor as "a model student," Katie is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta and Sigma Theta Tau honors societies. Her extensive community service includes volunteering with the American Nursing Students Association Diabetes Walk, Greensboro Urban Ministries Soup Kitchens, Friend's Home, and the children at Partnership Village.

Jill Sharpe is a Nursing major who will graduate with LIHC Disciplinary Honors. Her senior project pulled together detailed information that nursing students need in order to prepare for the NCLEX-RN exam, commonly known as "boards." She presented her findings in class and online, as well as at the poster presentation held by UNCG's Undergraduate Research Expo in April. She was co-author of an article entitled "Explicit and Implicit Stereotype Activation Effects on Memory: Do Age and Awareness Moderate the Impact of Priming" that was published in *Psychology and Aging*, 19(3), 495-505.

Lauren Sher is one of the first two students in the Department of Mathematics and Statistics to graduate with LIHC Disciplinary Honors. She has pursued the most demanding math concentration, pure mathematics, and was an early inductee into both Phi Beta Kappa and Pi Mu Epsilon, the very selective mathematics honor society. She is described by one of her professors as "among the top ten or twelve strongest of the outstanding mathematics majors we have had over my years at UNCG."

Robert (Bobby) Shimer is a double major in Spanish and Applied Linguistics, who possesses a rare combination of academic excellence and compassion. After volunteering for a summer, he was offered employment at Camp Joy, a camp for disabled and autistic children, in 2003, where he continues to work. He also teaches English at the Newcomers School and American Civics to immigrants at his internship with Lutheran Family Services, works with disabled and autistic children at Lindley habilitation Services in Greensboro, assists Spanish-speaking clients under the direction of their immigration attorney, and helps prepare future citizens for their citizenship exam. He helps fellow students in the classroom as well. One professor describes the group

project Bobby was assigned to do with a native French speaker and a Hmong speaker, both of whom had remained on the silent side of the language barrier for most of the semester. With Bobby's help, they were able to transcend that barrier and give the best presentation in the class. Another professor says, "Bobby restores my faith in what we're all doing here."

Benjamin Shook is a double-major in Philosophy and Psychology, who will graduate with LIHC Disciplinary Honors in Psychology. His senior thesis examines motivations for female binge drinking, and he has engaged in other research endeavors as well. He received an Undergraduate Research Assistantship and worked on an investigation of drug abuse that was funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse. He has submitted an abstract for a conference poster on this material, and if selected, will present at a regional conference. Ben served for six years in the U.S. Air Force and won an Enlisted Aircrew Member of the Year for 2001 as well as two Air medals and an Aerial Achievement medal for flight service in combat. He has volunteered as a "Big Brother, and this year he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Sigma Tau honor societies. He received an honorable mention for the Roger Schwirck Excellence in Philosophy Award and plans to attend law school.

Dana Shumate, a Nutrition major with a Chemistry minor, is described by one professor "as the top undergraduate student I have known during my 22 years in academia." Dana has earned an A+ in 18 of her courses at UNCG, and never less than an A. She is a member of Golden Chain, Kappa Omicron Nu honor society, and Sigma Alpha Lambda National Leadership and Honors Organization. She received the Moses Kiser Scholarship and the Annette L. Moore Scholarship (twice). She has consistently been on the Chancellor's and Dean's Lists, all while working 20-30 hours per week to pay for her education. Her volunteer work includes teaching at Kings Kids Children's Program; participating in mission trips to Honduras, New York City, and New Orleans; counseling at the Victory Junction Gang Camp; volunteering at Moses Cone Hospital, Samaritan's Purse, and Girls on the Run. In addition to all this, she obtained certification as a NC Certified Nurse Aide and an American Heart Association Health Care Provider. Her goal is to become a Physician's Assistant, and she has already been accepted to the

Methodist University program and is on the wait list at the Wake Forest University Medical Center.

Donna Smith is an Anthropology major with a minor in Environmental Studies. Her academic record is stellar, especially when you take into account all she does besides. She works in the Anthropology lab and has volunteered for Habitat for Humanity, the Boys' and Girls' Club, the Florida Street Garden Project, and Greensboro Beautiful clean-up efforts. She has been a math and chemistry tutor and received a scholarship from the Office of Leadership and Service Learning that enabled her to do an internship on an organic farm in Rockingham, NC. She presented her first paper at a major conference in Santa Fe, New Mexico, this March, and received one of the Harriet Kuperer-Outwin professional development awards from the Anthropology Department. She plans to attend graduate school and promote the benefits of organic agriculture.

Jill Sollenberger is a Chemistry and Biochemistry, who will graduate with LIHC Full-University Honors. In 2008, Jill received an Undergraduate Research Assistantship and presented a poster on her work this Spring. She also presented research on the ability of specific oils to interact with and inhibit human drug metabolizing enzymes at the recent Honors Symposium and again at the Northeastern Regional Meeting of the American Chemical society in Nashville. Another manuscript, based largely on her work, has been submitted for consideration to peer-reviewed journals. Jill participated in the Summer Internship Program at Targacept in Winston-Salem in 2008, the culmination of which was a day-long symposium in which interns from around the Triad presented their work in Medicinal Chemistry. Jill's presentation stood out as one of the best.

Lauren Stephens will graduate with a BS in Chemistry, a major that requires significantly more math, physics, and physical chemistry than a BA in Chemistry or a BS in Biochemistry. Lauren earned the highest grade in her physical chemistry course on quantum mechanics, and when she took the national American Chemical Society exam last semester, she scored in the 97th percentile among all undergraduates taking thermodynamics throughout the country, the best score on record at UNCG. She has been a Supplemental Instruction Program leader and has tutored students both formally and informally. She has worked for

two summers at the J. Craig Venter Institute in Rockville, MD, studying plant genomics. This summer she will work on experiments in rotational spectroscopy.

Casey Strange is an active participant in the Lloyd International Honors College and will graduate with LIHC Disciplinary Honors in both of the Sociology Department's concentrations—criminology and global social problems, the first UNCG student to do so. Her Honors thesis investigates notions of identity among Triad natives and immigrants through the art of photography. As a freshman, she was elected to the Budget Committee for the Warren Ashby Residential College, and she is a member of the Sociology Club and the Spanish American Latino Student Association (SALSA), where she is currently co-chair of its community service committee and its official historian. Last summer she worked full time in a demanding internship with the Hispanic League of the Triad and helped coordinate FIESTA, a large street festival in Winston-Salem that raises money for student scholarships. She volunteers with Habitat for Humanity and the Servant Garden, and she is the UNCG representative to the statewide Coalition for College Access. In recognition of her extensive service, she was recently elected to Golden Chain. One professor ranks her as easily among the top five percent of students he has taught in 33 years.

Janice Swanson plans to become a Registered Dietitian after she completes her degree in Nutrition. She has been an outstanding student and a classroom leader. In one class she developed and implemented a nutrition education workshop for elementary school students. This group project, which she led, required interaction with both students and school administrators, and she showed great creativity in presenting nutrition information to young children. In another class she developed a set of nutrition education materials aimed at health professionals, the general public, and low-literacy groups, respectively. Again, her work was described as "excellent." She volunteers with Groceries on Wheels, visiting her group of low-income, older adults far more often than the once-a-month requirement. In addition, she has gone beyond the requirements of her major to join a research project on the Food Assistance Inc. program.

Sterling Taylor will graduate with a double major in Political Science and International and Global Studies with a concentration in Russian Studies. An outstanding student, he is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta Honors Fraternity, Pi Sigma Alpha Political Science Honors Fraternity, *Dobro Slovo* National Slavic Honor Society, Golden Key International Honors Fraternity, and Phi Beta Delta International Studies Honors Fraternity. He is active in the Political Awareness Club and the Russian Studies Club and is a member of Lloyd International Honors College. In addition, he serves as Acting Platoon Leader for the North Carolina Army National Guard.

Kathryn Vish Wells graduated in December, 2008, with a degree in Philosophy. She is an active member of the Philosophy Club and won honorable mention for the Roger Schwirck Award for Excellence in Philosophy. Katherine is an excellent philosophy student, but her interests are wide-ranging, as evidenced by her involvement with Cornelia Strong Residential College (CSC). She served at CSC as a member of the social event planning committee, Hall Council Senator, and Resident Assistant. She also served on the admissions committee, founded the Jane Austen Book Club, organized faculty-student literary discussions, and spent many hours building community through informal tutoring and thoughtful conversation. According to the former Director of CSC, “Kathryn functioned practically like a staff member throughout her time at Strong College. Her maturity, her dedication, her positive outgoing nature, and her intellectual curiosity contributed immeasurably to the strength and continuity of our program.”

Ashley von Clausburg is a member of the Lloyd International Honors College, who will graduate with a double major in Dance and International and Global Studies. She has consistently appeared on the Chancellor’s and Dean’s lists and spent a full year studying at the *Universita Cattolica del Sacro Cuore* in Milan, Italy, where she also served as a public relations intern for the Joy Yaffe Branding Building Co. She has volunteered as a dance therapist at the Barstow Acres Camp for Children with Special Needs, and has been a member of the UNCG Dance Team, as well as a columnist and staff writer for the *Carolinian*. Ashley hopes to become a journalist or an arts administrator.

Ayshia Waddell is a Communication Sciences and Disorders major, who has been on the Chancellor's and Dean's lists since her first semester at UNCG. In 2008 she won the University Speech and Hearing Association Scholarship and has been involved in the UNCG chapter of the National Student Speech, Language, and Hearing Association, as well as holding down a part-time job. She is currently an Undergraduate Research Assistant, working on stroke prevention in the African American community. She presented her findings at a national convention in April. In addition, she has been a math tutor at Jackson Middle School, served in leadership roles in Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, acted as a mentor to young women throughout Guilford County, worked as a Greensboro Urban Ministry night shift volunteer, and served as a School of Health and Human Performance Ambassador. She is being recruited for graduate study at Howard University, Georgia State University, East Carolina University, and of course UNCG.

Jack Walleshauser will graduate with his department's most rigorous degree, BS in Chemistry with a concentration in Biochemistry. He was so successful in Instrumental Analysis Laboratory that he was asked to be the teaching assistant the following year. He presented his challenging senior research project, profiling microRNAs in mouse brain tissues, at the North Carolina State Undergraduate Research & Creativity Symposium and is currently writing a manuscript on this project for publication. Also, Jack has prepared a review article manuscript on the "sample preparation methodologies for imaging mass spectrometry." He was able to graduate in three years, while taking care of a family, and plans to attend graduate school. One professor describes him as "definitely in the top 3% of all the students that I have taught in the past seven years."

Matthew Wilhelm will graduate with a double major in Chemistry and Applied Mathematics. A recipient of the Katherine Smith Reynolds Scholarship, as well as several other departmental scholarships, he has consistently been on the Chancellor's and Dean's lists. He was one of eight student participants selected for the MathBio Fellowship funded by the National Science Foundation. He has presented his research on honey bees, among other topics, at numerous regional and national conferences, including UNCG's Office of Undergraduate Research Expo. By the time he graduates he will have submitted two different manuscripts for

publication in refereed journals. He scored very high in the Virginia Tech math competition and plans to attend graduate school in Chemical Engineering.

Megan Wilson will graduate with a BFA in Dance and a BA in French. She is Head Officer of Prime Movers, the UNCG student dance organization which produces a concert of student work each year, organizes special events, and helps send students to the American College Dance Festival Association. She was invited to present a work at the Greensboro Fringe Festival, an annual event featuring cutting-edge theater and dance in downtown Greensboro. Last spring she studied at the University of Angers in France, and she has used her French language skills to tutor a Gabonese family in English. Megan is one of the strongest students ever to graduate in Dance and, according to her professors, “has exceptional potential for graduate study,” whether it be toward a MFA or a PhD. “She has all the artistic and academic skills, and most importantly, the intellectual curiosity to succeed.”

Chad Workman is an Exercise and Sport Science major with a concentration in Fitness Leadership. His academic work has been favorably compared to that of graduate students. One professor describes him as “the most impressive undergraduate student in my field that I have ever encountered.” According to another professor, “His desire to understand is unparalleled by any other undergraduate that I’ve had in the past 11 years.” Chad has worked as a personal trainer for three years, as well as volunteering twelve hours per week in the UNCG athletic strength and conditioning program.
